Annual Vestry Report

for the year ending

December 31, 2021

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Then you... shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house. [Deuteronomy 26:11]

This year our Annual Vestry falls on the first Sunday Lent which in many ways is appropriate. It is fitting not because Lent is a season of abstinence or denial but because Lent is a season that calls us to reflect deeply on our faith. A time to reflect on the year past.

Most of us grew up with the idea that Lent is a time to give up, to deny ourselves something. More recently the Church's thinking has swung a bit and instead Lent is a time to take on, to engage with something: a bible study, an education event, perhaps attending church more regularly. This Lent in a year of reflection, it's a time for us, collectively as parishioners of this beloved place to reflect deeply on who we are and, critically, who we want to be.

This is a year that requires much thought.

We have come through our second year of lockdowns and of a new kind of worship and gathering. We've missed each other. However, in the process we've built on some of our strengths, created new liturgies and events that have drawn neighbours or friends to our property. We've been blessed by the planning of parishioners who've included us in their wills. Janet Taylor's bequest has added significantly to our funds invested with the Diocese. Gifts from Gordon Brearly and others allowed us to keep operating as did the generosity of parishioners who adapted to new ways of giving and who, when they could, increased givings.

It has been a hard year financially. Our rental income is down and in December our long-time tenants moved, meaning that at the end of the year our only major source of income was Rainbow Montessori. Worshipping at a distance for much of 2021 has affected our open plate and envelope givings. Some of our parishioners have moved, some have died and some are unable to maintain past levels.

Whilst worrisome it is important to remember St Martin's is not alone in this. Across the Diocese and beyond parishes are facing the same difficulties. Here in our Diocese we will be undertaking some serious discussions and making important decisions as we work through the 'Shape of Parish Ministry Consultation' process. Our own parish team will be thinking about our future and thinking about who we are and want to be. For a long time St Martin's has characterised itself as an "old" church with declining numbers. This may be true but it is also true of so many churches in our Diocese and in the country. For a long time St Martin's has described itself in terms of what we **cannot** do and what we **used** to do. We have looked back, not forward.

This year, this Vestry as we work towards our future I challenge—I **charge**—each one of us to think beyond the ways that we have come to think of our parish. I challenge us all to think of it not as a dying or declining parish but as a **living** parish

Yes, we've lost some significant and beloved parishioners in the past few years. Yes, our income has suffered significantly during the pandemic. Yes, our children have been missing from worship for two years now. Yes, we are a small congregation with a big building. For a while now all of these inarguable and not-inconsiderable facts have weighed us down; in a world

wearied by a pandemic they have, at times, been deeply disheartening.

In the midst of this, our Live Nativity and other outdoor activities are drawing in neighbours. In small but steady numbers over the past few years we have had enquiries from new members and people who have made their way to our doors. Within our parish family people are ensuring that those who are less connected are kept in touch, that envelope offerings reach us when we're closed and so many other things.

It is true that none of these positive things are enough to solve any of our major issues. They won't fill our pews or our coffers. What they can do, however, is provide seeds for our future.

As we move through our discussions and decisions this year, the most important one will be deciding **what story St Martin's want to live**. Over the coming year and a bit we will choose one of three paths: to close; to join with another parish; or to continue on here as a parish. As I have said before there isn't a wrong decision amongst these options and it's not so much which option we choose as it is important the **way we in which live out that choice**.

Our choice, our most important choice is **which is the story we want to live**. That means whatever we do, we must live intentionally, prayerfully, hopefully and to the honour and glory of God. What we must not do is to let things simply unfold and to settle into our narrative of 'too old, too poor, too few'.

What if, for example, we took that story of 'too old, too poor, too few' and turned it around? Is there a path ahead for what we are and what we have? Right now, we may be limited by the few talents we have but what if, instead of burying them for safekeeping, we grow those talents? To plan, to reach out...even to dream.

Ultimately it may be that we discern after prayer and consideration that we have reached an end. It may be that 'too old, too poor, too few' is our story. There is nothing wrong with that as long as we are intentional about that story and our own 'end times'. We must not simply wait it out; we must ask ourselves what we can do that captures and respects all who have gone before us? All that is St Martin's past and present. All that God desires for us?

As we going into this Vestry as we go into Lent, let us enter into a serious, prayerful reflection about this place, our lives here and where and what we want this parish to be. Just like a Lenten reflection, these will be sober reflections, perhaps even painful. But just like Lent which offers the promise of Easter and the joy to come, we also can be assured that our discernment about St Martins will offer the joy and the certainty that comes with our faith in God and in God's will.

Let us enter into this new year, this 'big' year hopefully, prayerfully, joyfully; mindful of the voice of God and the work of the Spirit amongst. Let us above all be thank for each and for the rich bounty which we and our house have been given.

Wardens Report

Churchwardens are appointed at an annual Vestry meeting, and with the Rector, make up the Corporation of the Parish. One warden is appointed by the Rector and one is elected by the Vestry (in 2021 Glenn and Ian respectively). The custom at St. Martin's has been that Wardens serve for two years. At the recommendation of the diocese, because of the pandemic, Ian and Glenn both served additional year in 2021. We were again this year fortunate that Vestry appointed Patricia Boyd to support the Wardens in their work, as St. Martin's deputy Warden. The Deputy Warden may act for an absent Churchwarden in many – but not all – of the Warden's capacities. Patricia has fulfilled these duties admirably throughout the year with good and practical ideas, valuable advice, and fresh perspectives on the difficult decisions that Corporation dealt with through 2021.

Duties of the Churchwardens are varied. Generally, the Churchwardens' duty is to carry out the proper directions of the Synod of the Ottawa Diocese, and of the Vestry of St. Martin's. Churchwardens must always act in this capacity together, not separately. More specifically, we are principally responsible for keeping the financial records of the Parish in good order, care and maintenance of the property, the buildings and their contents, and to make provision for conduct of Divine Services within the Parish. Glenn and Ian have been supported this year (again) in these duties by our Rector, Reverend Garden, our Treasurer Fiona Hills and Envelope Secretary, the other Lay officers of the Church and the many volunteers who have generously donated their skills and time during the year.

We note that Reverend Garden is now in the fourth year of her incumbency at St. Martin's. It continues to be a great pleasure to work with Reverend Garden.

And we also note that our Church Secretary, Elsie Laking for her continued, faithful, and trustworthy service to the Parish. This year Elsie continued to work from home frequently, and was often available to assist the Corporation and the parish outside of normal working hours.

Management of the effects of the global pandemic on the parish was the predominant issue faced by the Warden's for another year, as it was with the Rector and the other parish Lay officers and volunteers. This meant navigating, interpreting, reconciling and implementing the multitudinous rules, regulations and advice provided to us by the Federal, Provincial and Municipal authorities and their various departments and agencies, as well as those of the Ecclesiastical Province of Ontario and the Diocese of Ottawa.

The principal impacts of the pandemic in the Parish have been the disruption of worship services, administrative, financial and on the operations of our renters. The pandemic also necessitated the replacement of our Envelope Secretary at last year's Vestry meeting, and we are grateful to Margaret Bloodworth for offering her services in this capacity, and for Pat Bethel for continuing to contribute her depth of experience and energy to the parish in this area.

The Treasurer's report and the annual budget report on the Parish Finances in detail. Our financial situation reflects the stress placed on our income by the pandemic and the situation is serious. This is primarily due to continued loss of rental income in the second year of capacity restrictions affected

most of our regular renters. Givings by parishioners are also lower than we have previously experienced. We believe this is driven by low attendance, which in turn is driven by the pandemic; shutdowns, restrictions changing the worship services, and people's personal concerns over the potential for infection.

We undertook a major capital project this year and repaired the decaying masonry on the front stairs. This work was substantially completed in October but there will be some site clean-up in the spring of 2022.

In November, the tenants of the Rectory gave notice and moved out. The rectory is currently empty. Corporation and the Parish Council intend to find new tenants for this house but have some overdue repairs to carry out first.

Twelve months ago, both Glenn and Ian agreed to extend our tenure for another year, on the recommendation of the Executive Archdeacon. We both intend to step down as Warden at this Vestry. Patricia has accepted the Rector's appointment as Warden. It will be the duty of Vestry to elect the other Warden at the Vestry Meeting.

We thank the Rector and the Parish for the opportunity to serve in this capacity, and have enjoyed the support and encouragement of our fellow parishioners throughout our terms. We recommend this office as a rewarding and effective way to serve God and the Church.

1. Opening Prayer

2. Appointment of Vestry Clerk

3. Minutes of March 8th 2020 Meeting

Rector's Report:

- The written report is a lengthy one in light of the year and the issues faced by the church.
- It has been a year of abundance despite many losses and we have survived and grown.
- We have learned that as Anglican we can worship fruitfully outside of a physical church.
- Due to the shortage of resources, there is no nominating committee this year.
- Despite this the managed governance of the church will continue as the current post holders have agreed to stay on for at least another year.
- While it is hoped that in person worship will resume for Easter, online services have been offered and as reopening begins a strong on-line presence may continue with hybrid worship to be explored.
- It is a priority of corporation to reach our to parishioners without internet access and to families.

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- Plan is to use the coming year to re-examine our role with a of discernment with help from the diocese.
- Thank you to the corporation for their work developing the budget, to Fiona for work as the treasurer, and to the parishioners for their patience and continued support of St Martin's.
- Huge thank you to the Pandemic Opening Team for their work reopening the church in September.

Warden's Report:

- The roles of the wardens changed this past year. The principal task has been to manage the response of the Parish to the pandemic. In particular, this has meant managing the rentals and the dramatic loss of revenue.
- Financial, donations have increased but due to loss of the rental and parish activities (bazaar, parish dinner) the position is serious but the parish needs to look at how we operate. Fewer people attending which is making running the church a struggle.
- On advice from the executive Archdeacon, Glenn Bloodworth and Ian Marsh have agreed to put forth their names to continue as wardens for another year.
- Thank you to Patricia Boyd for her work as Deputy Warden.
- Great to see everyone here today.

- **David Jeanes**- Delegate to Synod 2021
 - This would be David's 2nd year as a Synod Delegate. Historically St Martin's elected Synod Delegates for sequential two-year terms to provide over-lapping corporate memory. However the Diocesan CBRs only provided for one-year terms.
- **Ian Marsh**- Delegate to Synod 2021
 - St Martin's is entitled by Diocesan SBRs to have two Synod Delegates in addition to the Incumbent. Historically we have filled one Synod Delegate position with a Warden.

While using the Cloud will incur a cost, they will be offset by the reduction in banking fees. Recognised by corporation that Treasurer is one of the most time-consuming volunteer positions within the parish.

Altar Guild Report

The Altar Guild has continued our ministry at St Martin's through another difficult and unpredictable year. Rev. Mary-Cate Garden has been understanding as we modify our protocols to meet the ever-changing COVID-19 guidelines.

Our membership remains stable with nine. Teams of 2-3 have met when the church was open to set up the Altar for Eucharist and to tidy up afterwards.

The Altar Guild was able to decorate for the celebration of Thanksgiving this year. Our lovely vegetable display was donated as in previous years after the service to The Shepherds of Good Hope. Thanks once again goes to David and Helga Jeanes for delivering the vegetables.

We were unfortunately unable to celebrate Christmas in person this year. We placed a smaller arrangement at the Altar for the online service. The money received from parishioners for the traditional larger Christmas memorial flowers has been set aside for Easter.

Memorial flowers were placed at the back of the Altar at the request of parishioners on several Sundays this fall. We are extremely happy with the arrangements and service provided by Flowers by Maggie and will continue to arrange for memorial flowers as able. Unfortunately, the cost of an arrangement, like everything else, has increased and we ask that you keep this in mind when making a request.

We are hoping that we will continue to meet in person and as always are happy to welcome new members. This ministry requires minimal time commitment (each team meets once a month) and the fellowship is wonderful. It is a great way to learn more about our Anglican traditions while providing a valuable ministry within our church.

2021 Synod Highlights

I was elected at Vestry 2020 for a 2-year term.

My sole activity in 2020 was the pro-forma online Synod to pass essential motions and receive the financial report. I did not participate in the election of Bishop Shane. (I had previously elected three bishops).

2021 Synod had a more elaborate online program with two pre-synod online briefings, a combined online/in-person Eucharist with Bishop's charge, reports, bylaw and canon amendments and guest speaker.

As synod delegate I also participated in all stages of the "Shape of Parish Ministry" process: online launch in April, questionnaire in May, "Town Hall" interview in September, review of parish profile in November, receipt of all parish profiles in December, online review meeting in February.

Because of the very limited activity during the two years of the pandemic, I am prepared to stay on for a second 1 or 2-year term if the parish so chooses. This would include seeing through the "Shape of Parish Ministry" to Synod 2022 and possibly 2023.

Outreach

During Covid, the collection of pop can tabs, used eyeglasses, milk bags and stamps has slowed considerably. That being said the pop can tabs which had been collected since early 2020 were delivered in December 2021 to Clifford Bowey School. They continue to be much appreciated and used to buy equipment for their students. No contribution is too small.

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Also, a large bag of used eyeglasses was dropped off at the Carlingwood Hakim Eye Centre to which a member of the Lions Club goes regularly to pick them up. However, my experience was that not everyone in the store was aware of this practice. I am working with the Lions Club to develop an article for Crosstalk which will inform other churches in the Diocese of drop off points for used glasses. Please continue to drop off used glasses at the church and I will be happy to put them into the system.

Over the past two- or three-years people have been leaving **milk bags** at my home. In the past most were given to the Old Forge which offers classes to teach how to turn a waste item into something useful. Meanwhile, in December 2021, I was able to pass on what had been collected to a friend who turns them crocheted mats. There were enough bags to make at least 3 mats each requiring more than 500 bags.

As life returns to 'normal', it is hoped the collection of used stamps can be rejuvenated. Though, we probably will never reach the quantities/weights of the pre-Internet era, your used stamps can continue to be a source of income for those suffering from Leprosy.

Please continue to save these items and until the church is reliably open, drop them off at my home at 458 Halldon Place. There is a box on my front step into which you may drop your contributions.

CANON 5.02 (A)

In all churches or places of worship of the Anglican Church of Canada within the Diocese in which a Vestry shall have been organized before this Canon takes effect, such Vestry shall consist of the following members: All persons who are qualified and willing to sign the Declaration below, before voting or being elected to any office in the said Church, or to membership in the Synod of the Diocese and who sign the same if required to do so by any member of the Vestry.

**"I solemnly declare that: I am a member of this congregation of the Anglican Church of Canada;
I am of the full age of sixteen years;
I am a regular worshipper with this congregation;
I do not intend to vote as a member of any other Vestry in the election of Church Wardens or of Members of Synod during the ensuing year;
and I am a supporter of this congregation by regular contributions to its maintenance."**

ADDENDUM

Envelope Secretary's Report

For the year ending December 31, 2021

Total envelope donations received in 2021 were **\$139,617.54**. Contributions for flowers, special holidays, PWRDF, outreach, etc. are included in that amount.

These envelope donations were made by 71 donors, 66 of whom contributed more than \$100. (In 2020 there were 80 donors, 70 of whom gave more than \$100).

The **median** donation was approximately \$912 (i.e. half of those giving over \$100 gave more than this amount and half contributed less). The **average** donation of these donors was \$2112.69.
